STRANGE ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE

At the Westminster police-court, London, yesterday, Julia Kelly, 25, a neatly-dressed young woman, was charged with attempting to commit suicide.-Prisoner was found by Police-constable 402 B on the Thames Embankment at Grosvenorroad at twelve o'clock the previous night. She went down the steps to the water-side, and, upon being brought back by the officer, attempted to jump over the parapet, but was prevented. She was the worse for liquor, and said, "I've tried it before, and I will do it."-Prisoner, who began to cry, said she could not say what induced her to attempt such a thing. She was very sorry .- Mr Partridge remanded her to the House of Detention for a week in order that she might be visited by the chaplain.
